## **WSCA Legislative Update**

The Washington Legislature concluded its business on April 23<sup>rd</sup> at 10 p.m. and adjourned Sine Die. On the final day of the session, lawmakers adopted a \$69 billion budget which included funding for several critical programs, including special education, free school meals for students, and college in the high school programs. The Senate passed the budget with bipartisan support, but the House vote was strictly along party lines. The budgets passed the House and Senate relatively early in the day Sunday.

However, the final vote on a controversial drug possession bill failed in a dramatic fashion late Sunday and Governor Inslee is suggesting he may call the Legislature back into a special session to resolve the issue before June  $30^{th}$ .

The issue stems from a 2021 Supreme Court ruling that the state's felony drug possession law was unconstitutional. That year, the Legislature passed a stop-gap bill making drug possession a misdemeanor, but ending that policy by July 1, 2023. A compromise bill emerged on Saturday evening that would have raised the penalty to a gross misdemeanor, but would have prevented local jurisdictions from adopting their own ordinances. Republicans in the House locked up to vote against the bill, arguing that local governments should adopt their own policies. With a divided Democratic caucus, the bill only garnered 43 of the necessary 50 votes to pass, even though the Speaker left the vote open for several minutes trying to persuade members to change their votes.

As of adjournment, it is unclear whether a special session will occur.

House Minority Leader JT Wilcox (R-Roy) announced on the last day of session he will be stepping down as caucus leader. He plans to remain in the Legislature. A vote for new leadership is expected to take place before the end of May. Deputy Leader Joel Kretz (R-Wauconda) may also be stepping down, but that has yet to be confirmed.

Senate Ways & Means Committee Chair Christine Rolfes (D-Bainbridge Island) has announced her interest in being appointed to the Kitsap County Commission upon the departure of Commissioner Rob Gelder on May 23rd. Although it's possible to serve as both a County Commissioner and State Senator, Rolfes has said publicly she will not remain in the Senate if she secures the appointment. A vacancy in one of the most powerful committees in the Legislature would likely set off a chain reaction of events as a new Chair is selected, as well as a new Senator from the 23<sup>rd</sup> District.

- E2SHB 1238, a bill to provide free school meals to about 600,000 Washington students, has passed the Legislature and been delivered to the Governor for his signature. The budget includes \$23.4 million to implement HB 1238.
- HB 1308, establishing an additional graduation pathway option of completing a performance-based learning experience, has passed the Legislature and been delivered to the Governor for his signature.
- 2SHB 1316, legislation to expand access to dual credit programs, has been passed and delivered to the Governor.
- HB 1436, funding for Special Education, has been passed by the Legislature and received a robust \$352 million in funding for implementation in the final operating budget. The bill increases the 13.5% cap to 15% beginning in the 2023-24 school year, and increases the multiplier as follows:

Pre-K	1.15	1.2

The bill also stipulates if a student's IEP costs exceed 2 times the average per-pupil expenditure, the district may access the safety net for high cost students (for districts with more than 1,000 FTE students, IEP costs must exceed 2.2 times the average expenditure). The operating budget included funding for a JLARC study as well as a performance audit of special education, but it did not include funding for special education navigators that had been included in previous versions of the bill.

- 2SSB 5048, funding "College in the High School" courses for all students, has been passed by both chambers and is headed to the Governor. This bill eliminates all fees for students participating in CHS programs.
- In addition to the important policy priorities listed above, the final operating budget also included \$27,000 for ongoing work related to the implementation of SB 5030 (2021) and continues the funding for school counselors, nurses, social workers and psychologists based on HB 1664 (2022).
- For qualifying high-poverty schools with > 50% free & reduced lunch in the prior school year, an additional allocation for school counselors is provided (.166 for elementary/middle school and .157 for high school).
