# **WSCA Legislative Update**

Four weeks remain in the 2023 legislative session, and policy committees have just three more days to advance bills to keep them alive for the remainder of this session. Many important education related bills have continued to advance through the legislative process, including bills to fund special education, expand graduation pathways, and provide free school meals to students.

Legislation to expand access to dual credit programs (2SHB 1316) was passed from the Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education Committee last week after a robust discussion about a proposed amendment from Senator Brad Hawkins to include a provision to allow 10<sup>th</sup> graders to participate in online running start classes. The committee rejected Sen. Hawkins' amendment, but the Chair, Senator Lisa Wellman, expressed her interest in supporting an amendment when the bill reaches the Senate floor, if it has appropriate sideboards. WSCA, AWSP, and WEA have expressed concerns about this concept to members of the Senate (see attached). Watch the exchange in committee at 1:55 here.

HB 1308, legislation to expand graduation pathways for students, passed unanimously out of the Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education Committee last week, and is now in the Rules committee. An amendment from Senator Jaime Pedersen makes the following changes:

- Revises the definition of "demonstrate readiness" with respect to graduation pathways to mean the student meets or exceeds state learning standards addressed in the chosen pathway.
- Requires that the performance-based learning experience graduation pathway option provides evidence that the student meets or exceeds state learning standards in English language arts and mathematics, rather than at least two of the mandatory core subject areas.
- Requires the SBE to establish graduation proficiency targets and associated rubrics aligned with state learning standards in English language arts and mathematics.
- Moves the subsection detailing the performance-based learning experience graduation pathway option.

The big news last week was, of course, the release of the Senate's operating budget proposal.

In the first year of each biennium, the Washington State Economic and Revenue Forecast Council is required to submit a revenue report by March 20. This report helps budget writers put finishing touches on the budgets that are released near that date. Last Monday, the revenue report forecast a slowdown in the state's economic activity due to lower-than-expected real estate excise tax collections and personal income combined with higher interest rates. Projected Near General Fund revenue collections for the 2023-25 state budgets have decreased by an estimated \$483 million, a 0.7% drop from the number forecast last November. Total Near General Fund revenues are now projected at \$65.7 billion for the next two-year budget cycle, which begins July 1.

Each December, Washington's governor releases proposed budgets and subsequently, the legislative chambers release their own, which are based on that first budget. This year, with four weeks left in the legislative session, Senate budget writers released their budgets first.

On Thursday afternoon, Senate budget writers released their \$69.2 billion operating budget. The two-year operating budget adds roughly \$5.1 billion in new spending and does not rely on any new general taxes or fees. It leaves \$3.8 billion in reserves. Highlights include:

### Education, Higher Education and children

- \$59 million to expand food access in schools
- \$375 million to increase support for special education students
- \$100 million to reimburse districts for special transportation needs
- \$525 million for educator salaries and health care costs
- \$25 million to pay fees for the College in the High School programs
- \$22 million for health care workforce and training (including new nursing slots)
- \$13 million to continue support for the College Grant scholarship program
- \$106 million to expand the number of ECAP early learning slots and increase provider pay
- \$215 million to bolster the childcare workforce
- \$49 million to help the state place more foster kids

On Friday morning, legislative Democrats received much anticipated good news for their budgets when the Washington State Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of the Capital Gains tax in *Quinn v. State of Washington*. The 2021 law applies a 7% tax to capital gains profits over \$250,000 with proceeds to go to early childhood education programs.

House budgets are expected to be released Monday, March 27. The remainder of the session is a negotiation for a final deal for each budget between the two chambers.
