# **WSCA Legislative Update**

The first major deadline of the 2023 session has arrived, and the number of bills facing lawmakers for action this session just decreased significantly.

Nearly 1,600 bills have been introduced so far this year. The average number of bills passed in a long session over the past decade is about 385. While there are still plenty of ideas to be hashed out over the next nine weeks, it's clear that even many of the bills currently "alive" won't make it to Sine Die.

As of 5:00 Friday, February 17<sup>th</sup>, any bill that did not pass from the policy committee into which it was initially referred is considered "dead" for this year. If a bill is going to cost money, it will have advanced to a fiscal committee (Ways & Means, Appropriations, Finance, Transportation), where the next hurdle to clear is Monday, February 27<sup>th</sup>. Beginning February 28<sup>th</sup>, lawmakers will largely be caucusing and voting on bills on the floor of their respective chambers.

The next ten days, legislators will primarily be hearing bills in the fiscal committees.

### Graduation pathways bill clears committee hurdle

HB 1308 passed out of the House Education committee with a 10-5 vote on Monday. Rep. Monica Stonier, the bill's champion and sponsor, spoke strongly in favor of supporting students working toward their graduation goals. She acknowledged that the bill is also a strong workforce development bill, and it is permissive for districts – not mandated. Representatives Paul Harris, Lillian Ortiz-Self and Sharon Tomiko-Santos also spoke in favor of the bill.

Rep. Mike Steele spoke against the bill, saying lawmakers shouldn't keep making it easier to graduate and stating his position that legislators do students a disservice if they let them graduate and they're not ready. Rep. Sharon Santos said we don't want to leave students behind.

Of the 5 Republicans voting no, two voted "without recommendation" instead of "do not pass."

### Special Education & funding bills advance

There are a number of proposals this session to address concerns about funding for special education, and most have cleared the policy committee deadline and are awaiting either a hearing or vote in a fiscal committee.

SB 5311, sponsored by Sen. Lisa Wellman, increases the cap on total student population for special education services from 13.5% to 15%. The bill also proposes to increase the multipliers for Pre-K - 12 students. The bill passed out of the Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education Committee unanimously, and is in the Ways & Means Committee awaiting a vote.

HB 1109, sponsored by Rep. Tana Senn, proposes to allow school districts to hire staff outside of contract hours to help relieve the backlog of IEP evaluations. The additional staff time will be funded through a grant program. It passed out of the House Education Committee unanimously and is scheduled for executive action in the House Appropriations committee Monday, 2/20.

HB 1436, sponsored by Rep. Gerry Pollet, also proposes to increase special education funding. The bill in its current form is a substitute version which takes a more moderated approach than the Senate bill, likely due to concerns about the cost to implement it. A number of organizations spoke with concerns about the bill in the hearing last week. It is scheduled for executive action in the House Appropriations committee Monday, 2/20. It is unclear which version of the bill will be voted upon.

HB 1305, also from Rep. Pollet, proposes to modify the requirements for initial student evaluations for special education and for IEP development. The bill passed out of the House Education Committee by a vote of 13-2, and has not been scheduled for a hearing in House Appropriations. There are concerns about the expedited timelines in the bill and whether they're realistic in the fact of the current workforce shortage.
