WSCA Legislative Update

The 2023 Washington legislative session is more than halfway over, and as each deadline passes, the scope of bills on the Legislature's agenda becomes narrower. The House of Representatives met all day Saturday and into Sunday morning, adjourning after 1:30 a.m. Lawmakers tackled a series of tough issues over the past week, including health data privacy, special education funding, and some big criminal justice bills.

The House and Senate will be on the floor the next three days, and the next cutoff for bills to pass out of their respective chambers is 5 p.m. Wednesday. All bills must be passed from their chamber of origin to remain viable for the session.

- The House and Senate have each passed legislation to improve funding for special education. During the floor debate in the House, Republicans tried to pass an amendment to make E2SHB 1436 look more like the Senate's version SSB 5311 although the amendment failed 44-52 after a long debate. The Senate bill proposes to increase the enrollment cap to 15%, increase the multipliers, and includes a requirement that each ESD region have at least one special education ombuds. The Senate bill passed unanimously.
- WSCA signed a letter with the WEA, AFT and AWSP last week, urging the Senate to reconsider its support for legislation to allow sophomore students to participate in running start (2SSB 5670). The bill is on the Senate floor calendar.
- E2SHB 1238, legislation to provide free meals to all students, has been significantly scaled back from its original proposal. The bill as it passed the House will now only apply to students in grades K-4 in schools with greater than 40% of free & reduced lunch population next school year, and 30% in 2024-25.
- Legislation on "isolation & restraint" practices has not passed the House yet (2SHB 1479) but a proposed amendment from the sponsor would narrow the bill to clarify that a "room clear" isn't considered isolation, and make some additional changes.
